This Standard was prepared by the Standards Australia Committee on Prams and Strollers to supersede AS 2088—1988, following widespread testing of products to the previous Standard.

Some of the requirements and procedures for carrying out tests and reporting the results have been reworded to clarify the intent of the particular clause.

The test for security of locking devices has been modified by a reduction in the number of times that the vehicle must be tipped and allowed to fall. With testing to be carried out with the vehicle in all seating and handle configurations, this part of the test formerly required some strollers to be dropped so many times that damage was unavoidable. This part of the test is now required to be carried out only in Group C testing, as a final method of determining whether locking devices remain functional.

A new method of test and measurement for determining the efficiency of parking devices has replaced the former test, and has been designed to more effectively measure the efficiency of a parking device, particularly where there are swivel wheels which must be left unlocked during the test. The allowance of movement of wheels following the application of the parking device has been increased from 20 mm to 50 mm to cover variations in brake designs where braking does not occur directly on to the tyre.

The requirements from the previous Standard for objects which could come into contact with a child's head have been included in this edition as advisory notes. Formerly the requirements prevented most 'umbrella' type strollers from compliance with the Standard. The committee preparing the Standard felt that these requirements were more related to comfort than to safety.
