PREFACE

This Standard was prepared by the Standards Australia Committee CS-106, Consumer Product Management Systems.

The objective of this Standard is to provide practical guidance to suppliers on assessing and managing the safety of consumer products, including effective documentation of risk assessment and risk management to meet applicable requirements.

This Standard is identical with, and has been reproduced from ISO 10377:2013, Consumer product safety—Guidelines for suppliers.

As this Standard is reproduced from an International Standard, the following applies:

- (a) In the source text 'this International Standard' should read 'this Australian Standard'.
- (b) A full point substitutes for a comma when referring to a decimal marker.

There are no normative references in the source document.

Consumer products in Australia may be subject to one or more of several different regulations depending on the nature of the product.

Suppliers need to identify all relevant regulations and take appropriate action to comply.

Information is available from the ACCC at www.productsafety.gov.au, state electrical authorities, state food authorities, NICNAS at www.nicnas.gov.au, and others.

Information may also be available from other non-government sources such as consumer and industry associations.

Suppliers are also required to consider and comply with non-safety related requirements governed by other authorities, e.g. those for certain labelling requirements, electromagnetic compatibility, etc.
